Synchronous

the learner and teacher interact in real time

- Videoconferencing via Zoom/Skype etc, chat

Asynchronous

the learner and teacher are not in the same place at the same time

- Interactive online activities
- Recorded video and audio lectures
- Forums, discussion boards, emails etc

- Videoconferencing via Zoom/Skype etc, chat

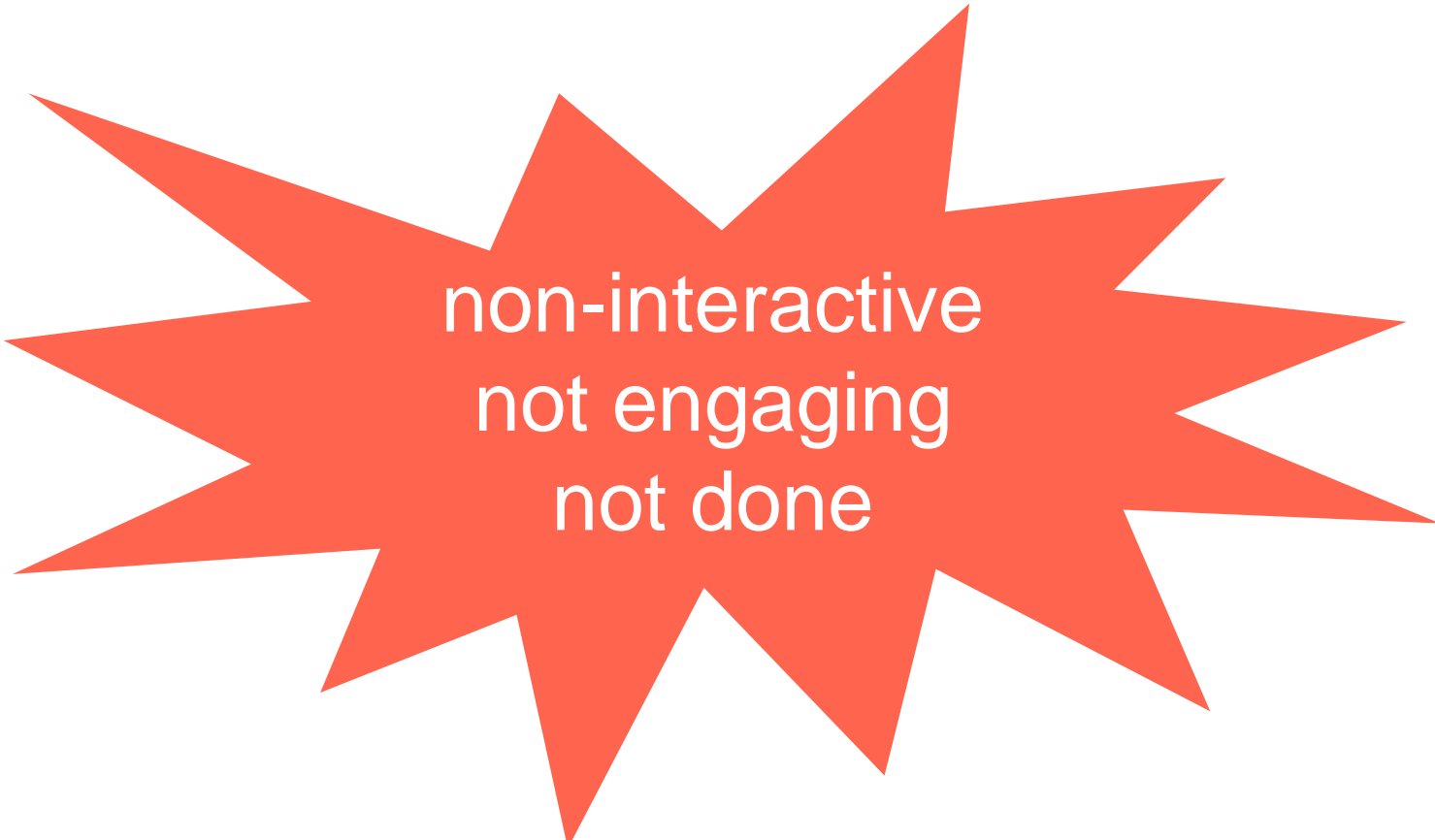
Asynchronous

time-fixed

What exactly is the ratio?



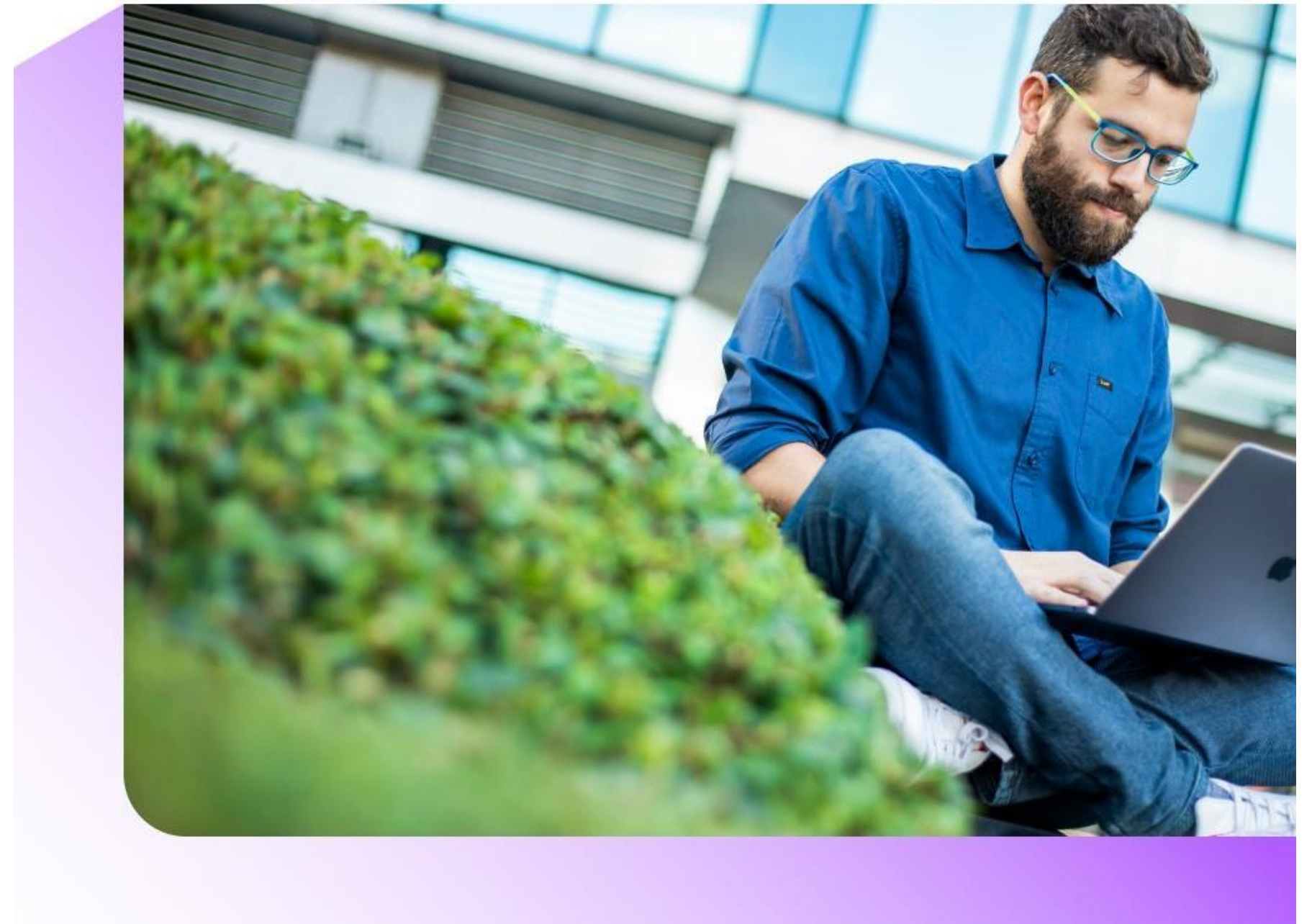
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a blend of asynch

What's the lesson structure?

Every English Online Lesson is a simple combination of three elements:

Asynch

Pre-class activities

- *controlled language practice*
- *contextualisation*
- *input texts*

Synch

Live class

- *freer practice of language and speaking*
- *collaboration*
- *interaction*

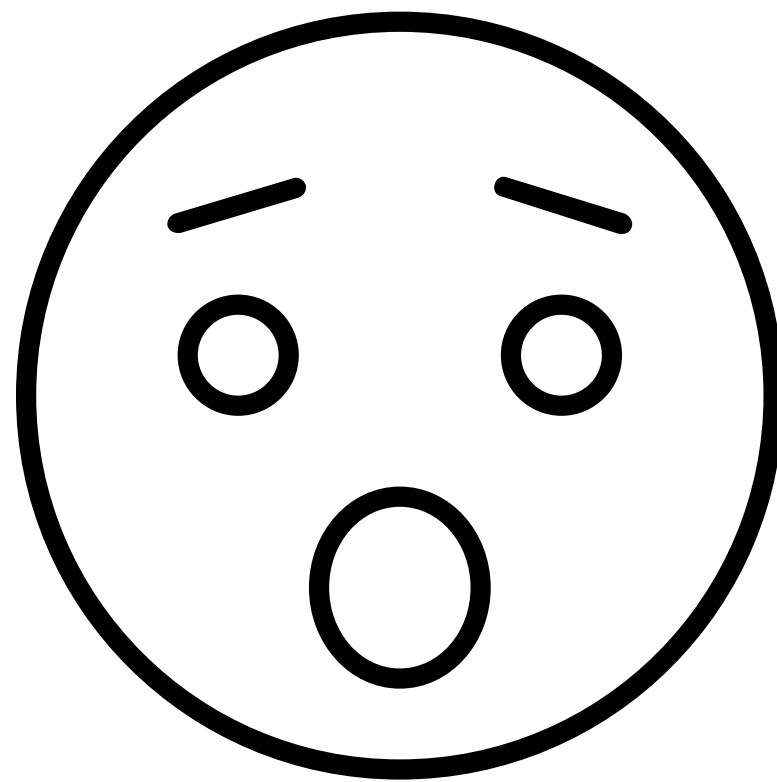
Asynch

Post-class activities

- *vocabulary cards*
- *more input text activities*
- *extra language practice*

What makes it special?

More than 90% of English Online learners regularly complete the pre-class and post-class activities.



Why is it effective?

- 1) The three components **form a complete whole** (not seen as 'extra')
- 2) The asynch activities are short and easy to complete (**low entry threshold**)
- 3) The asynch activities provide immediate **feedback** and error correction (automated)
- 4) The teacher in live class **emphasizes the importance** of asynch via a variety of techniques:
 - direct advice
 - review activities
 - reflection activities

Outcomes



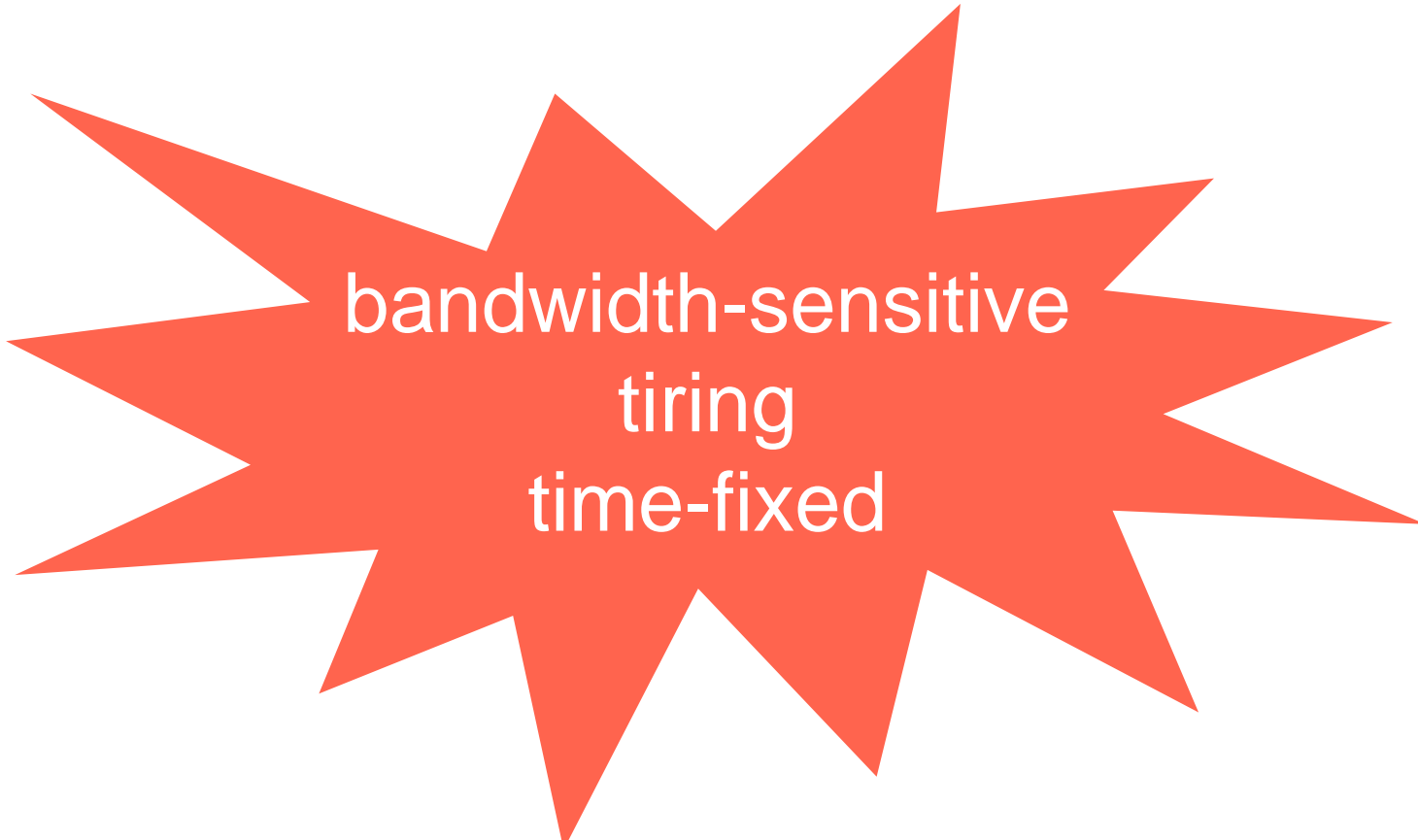
If the balance is right...

Synchronous activities

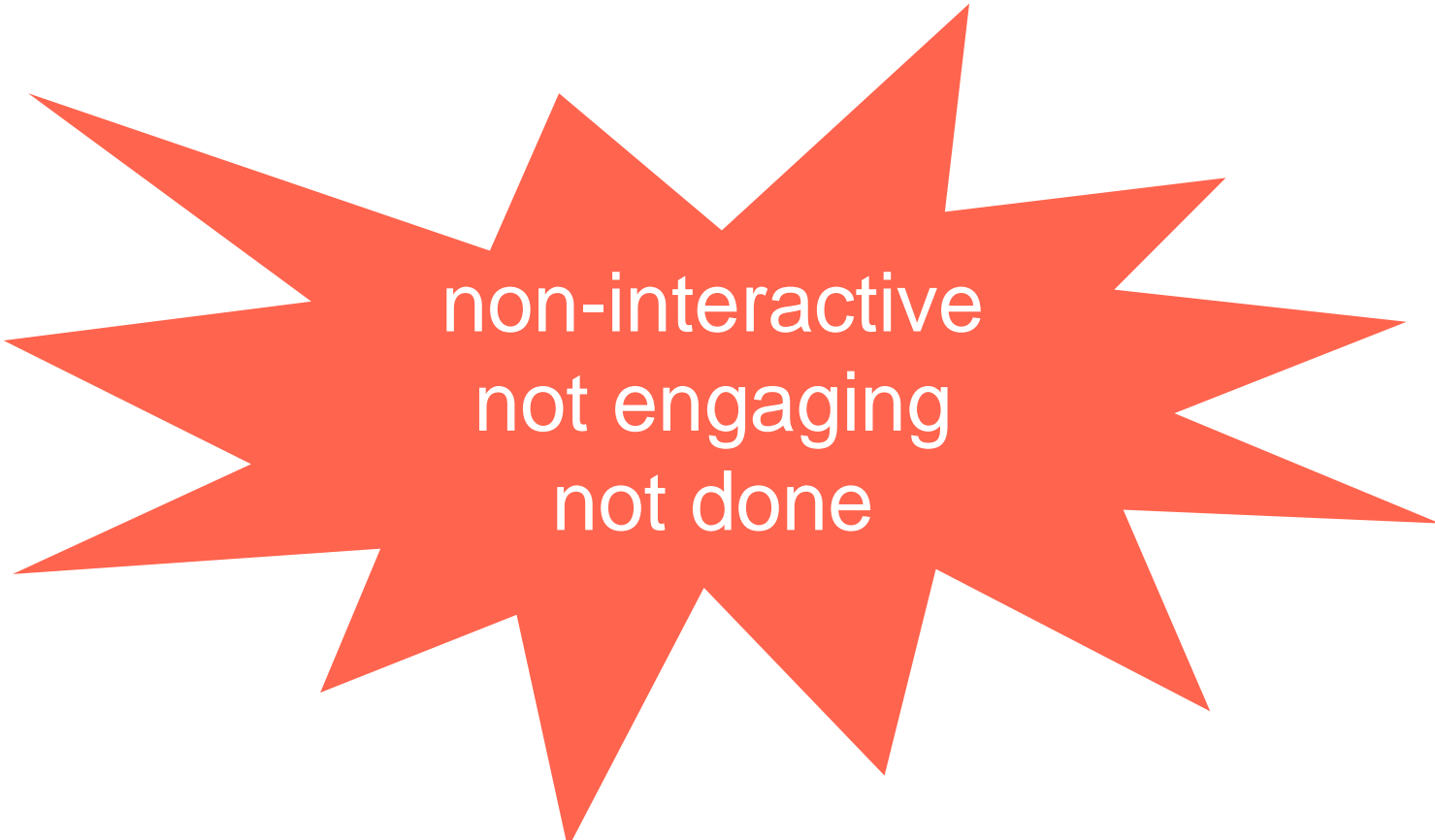
- include only what needs live interaction
- are not tiring or too time-consuming

Asynchronous activities

- offer immediate feedback
- allow to learn at own pace
- are seen as essential
- are **easy** to do
